No physical contact including hand shaking. Maintain a 2m distance from any occupiers. Occupiers to have opened all doors (including any garage or outbuilding and loft hatches) and turned on all lights to minimize the need for contact with hard surfaces. Only touch those surfaces absolutely necessary. Avoid touching face. Catch coughs and sneezes in single use tissues and then use hand sanitizer immediately. Any occupiers in the property should ideally wait in the garden, or outside the property, during survey. If this is not possible follow the instruction of the Surveyor on where they should stay and when/where they should move. Surveyor to communicate clearly to occupiers on where they will be in a property and when it is safe for the occupiers to move rooms. If the Surveyor at any time feels unsafe they should leave the property immediately. Surveyors should use their professional expertise and common sense. 	All	Immediately	Yes

You should review your risk assessment if you think it might no longer be valid (e.g. following an accident in the workplace or if there are any significant changes to hazards, such as new work equipment or work activities)
